





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
The Texas Weekly/Texas Tribune insider poll for the week of August 6











How will the election results affect the clout of top state officials?

- "Between his primary/run-off endorsement record and his national performance, RP has seen the luster come off his political shine. DD and JS remain in relatively the same position, even if they've got more conservative members."
- "Perry is seriously damaged goods...opposing him will be a lot easier. Dewhurst may face a revolt from Senators counting on him being gone by January. Straus will always sit uneasily in the Speaker's chair, but he's okay for now."
- "Perry did what he had to do. No more no less...no effect. Dewhurst is still Lt. Guv and Senators still respect

- him. With House trending more to the right, Straus should be concerned."
- "The people currently in power will always tell everyone they were the 'winner' from recent developments... don't believe them."
- "All will be reacting, directly or indirectly, to the shadow of the Tea Party."
- "Perry still holds the whip hand on agencies, but he also only won w/39%;"
- "There are a lot of people that will try to say that Perry is weaker and that he has less influence. Like Perry

always does, he will get a pass on this with the Republican voters. Have the Texas Poll as the favorables of Perry. Straus easily holds he Speakership and will continue to drive Empower Texan crazy/sane."

- "Rick Perry has no stroke in his own state. If Dewhurst remains in office, he will be neutered and furthered embarrassed by the senators. Straus has his head on a swivel, if not the chopping block."
- "Conventional wisdom says they've been hurt, I know, but all three can be fine, if they're flexible. They each have a lot of residual power."
- "Perry or Dewhurst will be challenged next election. Probably, by Abbott."
- "It is doubtful that Perry or Dewhurst will any longer aspire for federal jobs. Nor will they convince voters that they love their jobs more than life itself. Rather they will cling to their reduced power for as long as they can."
- "These leaders, effectively, all lost a party election for a major office."
- "No more compromise."
- "Dewhurst is the big loser as the guy who wanted to a new job, failed the interview, and now has a boss (the public) that knows he's disinterested in his current job."
- "Members are tired of Perry. Each of the election results/losses for the

Legislature were not the result of the Tea Party, but the result specific of a specific set of problems each candidate possessed."

- "Blood is in the water, Patterson smells Dew's blood."
- "2012 has proven to be a very bad year for Gov. Perry. His disastrous showing in the presidential race appears to have significantly damaged his standing at home. Dewhurst is, of course, weakened somewhat by his US Senate primary loss, but he wasn't that strong to begin with. Straus appeared to have emerged from the primary with a wash. He lost some lieutenants, but some unfriendlies were eliminated as well. That coupled with a half dozen or so additional Democrats, should solidify his position."
- "No solutions for the state's problems (schools, roads, water) from this crowd."
- "Can't be good for either Perry or Dewhurst. I don't have a clue on Straus, though it's a given that the tea party folks will be energized and flexing. My bet is that he is back at the big podium in January."
- "Dewhurst is a free man not constrained by future elections."
- "Much, much stronger will be the far-farther-right representatives who will replace the defeated committee chairs."

Do you think David Dewhurst will run again, either for reelection or for another office?

- "Too old. Already tagged as out of touch with the base/electorate. Some say his heart hasn't been in it the past couple of sessions. Might be time for the cowboy to rope his last calf and retire to the ranch."
- "If Perry quits, he'll try to buy the governorship. If Perry runs again, he won't run again. He could possibly even resign before January, because he knows how little his word is worth in the Senate."
- "Egos run large."
- "What's he gonna run for? Gov? He's liberal compare to Perry so he can't run on a Tea party platform, and he sure as hell can't run as a moderate after he tried to sell himself as a conservative. The only thing he has is to stay second in command, but now he's gonna have to really fight for it."
- "Cruz proved he's a paper tiger."
- "Who will he trust when they tell him to self-fund another race after wasting \$20 million this go round?"
- "Think the "players" on the bench will finally get a chance to move up. Dewhurst hangs up his hat next go round."
- "After the voters tell you no, then...."
- "He will never win another race in Texas."
- "Let's just say he shouldn't. Money can't buy you love."
- "If he's smart;)"

- "He won't run again because 1) Tricia wanted DC and that is off the table, 2) David is smarter than that. As the saying goes, "Fool me once..."
- "He can't risk another defeat."
- "Unless the Widow Bivins finds another landing spot (or another spouse)"
- "He may not know it yet, but he's toast. Burnt toast."
- "He's damaged goods who was rejected by his own party. There's absolutely nowhere for him to go. It's over, whether he can accept that fact or not."
- "The Dew even thinks \$24 Million is a lot of money."
- "He will run, but he will not win."
- "Buh-bye, Dew."
- "He wants to be governor but the people would prefer Abbott."
- "No reason to believe Dewhurst could win for Governor and he has lost enormous credibility at the capitol."
- "The party Dewhurst helped create has left the building. He can't relate and doesn't want to relate to those voters who now decide republican primaries."
- "If he wants to pay off the millions he loaned his campaign then he will run again so the lobby can pay off his loans through contributions."

- "He may resign early..."to be with his family. The campaign has shown me how much my family means to me and I owe it to them to be there." Blah, blah, blah..."
- "He's done. His cutting horses are much less difficult to deal with than egomaniacal state senators."
- "It's time to fire up the Gulfstream and head to the Chateaux."
- "Now that the Lt. Gov has shown his money can't save him in a primary, he will likely conclude that he can't win reelection or another office. So, in his late 60s, he will likely walk away in 2014."
- "He's too old."

- "What for? He can go home, enjoy his young wife and remaining money, and rope calves."
- "I can't see Perry or Dewhurst running again...too many loyal surrogates waiting impatiently."
- "I obviously don't know his plans, but would guess that there will be tremendous pressure for him to step aside from those with higher ambitions."
- "He will be a high-profile ambassador should Governor Romney become president"
- "He just ran the worst campaign this side of Rick Perry's presidential campaign, outspent his opponent 3 to 1, and lost badly. He's done."

Have the results so far helped or hurt Joe Straus' chances of another term as Speaker?

- "Sure, he's lost some chairmen, but he still retains the support of at least 76 representatives, which at the end of the day, makes him the Speaker."
- "This development will be used against Strauss but his position is secure."
- "Last man standing among the big three."
- "He has worked hard to pick up support from new members. He is everywhere."
- "I'm not sure, and I don't think the shift in the house is any different than what occurred in 2010."

- "While the results hurt the Speaker's chances, still no candidates who can muster the votes to defeat him."
- "No effect."
- "But he will still win easily"
- "No real impact due to the lack of another consensus candidate, if anything, should solidify D support."
- "The far right will never be comfortable with Straus... and we just elected a BUNCH of far right guys..."
- "But Hughes cannot beat Straus."
- "He's free to do what he thinks is best for Texas."

- "Can't say they hurt or help. I will say that Simpson seems to be attempting to get the fish under his wing and I'm assuming this is an attempt to sway them to vote for another speaker...Hughes."
- "As the incumbent, Strauss stays unless someone pushes him out. Nothing has occurred that is remotely close to pushing him out. Annoying? Yes. A threat to another term? No."
- "Really about a wash. The biggest concern would be the "out with the old" results, but Strauss is relatively new and young."
- "But conventional wisdom suggests he holds on"
- "He'll get it anyway. The far right has no one with talent or charisma."
- "He didn't really need any help. He's got the votes. He's got the record. He's got the results. Any questions?"
- "No one thinks Straus will not be Speaker again. That should be obvious when the best candidate to come forward is a Trial Lawyer. Who thinks TLR is going to let that happen."
- "Losing chairman like it's going out of style can't be a good thing."
- "The speaker has lost some chairman, but there are still very few members in the Hughes camp."
- "He is the weakest of the 3. And now weaker than ever."
- "Question posed poorly...as usual.... neither helped nor hurt substantively"

- "Straus suffered marginal damage in the run-off after a substantial loss of lieutenants in the primary. What he leads now is a House even more dominated by anti-government radicals. His time as Speaker - never fun - will be even less-so next year."
- "Overall, his team is still in place to get him another term, however, there will be some who are reading the tea leaves and may want to jump ship."
- "No change."
- "Straus will be ok for one more term...exactly the amount of time he wants to have anyway."
- "You want me to chair a committee, of course I'm with you Mr. Speaker..."
- "Probably re-elected. Watch Tea Partyish house members who will feel emboldened. Watch the d coalition that supported Straus. Will all d's stay with him or will some re-align?"
- "Weakened his position, but he will survive."
- "Who's going to challenge him? Remember, for every one of his lieutenants that lost, there are new committee chairs and plumb assignments to dole out."
- "When 50% of the voting pool has no frame of reference before 2011, the known quantity is the safe choice."
- "Joe Straus will be Speaker again, no ifs, ands or buts."
- "Speakers got 40 new committee assignments to make including several new chairs advantage Straus."

- "Again, I think the primary results are largely a wash for him. But there will likely be 6 or 7 new Democrats in the House come January. Where else are they going to go?"
- "The election hurt Straus, but probably not enough to kill him. Unless Trey M-F gets fancy."
- "The Speaker has lost some loyal buddies . . . but some of the "loyal

- opposition" have gone away as well. Too early to tell, but leaning toward the "hurt" selection at the moment. Too bad."
- "But that is relative, he should easily get reelected. Who does the other side have to put up? Bryan Hughes? I don't think so."
- "No impact."

You be the pundit: What's your take on the election results?

- "I think Republicans should be concerned about the long-term viability of their party in an environment where moderate's are demonized and defeated. White married women will decide the majority of the elections in swing districts in the fall and I don't think they woke up on Wednesday feeling like the Republican Party was getting any closer to sharing their values."
- "I thought conventional wisdom was that if turn out were higher it would be good for Dewhurst, that Cruz needed low turn out to win. Boy, were we wrong! Looking ahead: what does Abbott decide to do with \$12mm in the bank?"
- "Voters hate Washington and do not know the difference between Washington and Austin governments. Sad."
- "3 things happened: 1). The DeMint/Cornyn US Senate Leadership fight provided Cruz with \$17 Million in campaign funds that allowed Cruz to get his message out 2). The voter mood is anti-incumbent. Dewhurst ran as a virtual incumbent

- with out having the advantages of incumbency. 3). Ted Cruz is an exceptionally talented candidate."
- "The beginning of the end for the corrupt Perry machine."
- "Anti-establishment. Not a good time to be an established incumbent running against an "outsider"."
- "Not a good time to be an incumbent. Tea Party is more organized and effective and has become a bigger player and consideration in politics Bipartisanship is dead for the time being."
- "Conventional wisdom would make one think that whoever had the lead in the primary would probably win the runoff - take that wisdom and throw it out the window."
- "Voters have looked behind the curtain, and while they still want a show from time to time, they're figuring out the special effects."
- "Dewhurst wasted his money and his consultants got rich."

- "Mama said there'd be days like this. Think passing good public policy and working collaboratively will be much harder as the primary voters seem intent on pushing D.C. style politics into TX."
- "Scary!"
- "You reap what you sow, and Texas Rs have encouraged the far right to the point that it came around in the case of Dewhurst and Perry and bit them in the ass. Serves them right but is really bad for the future of our state."
- "The electorate has lost faith in incumbents. I believe that Washington is the culprit for this."
- "All elections are local. With a few exceptions, the results can be explained on a race-by-race basis. It is overbroad to characterize the results as Tea Party driven. Tea Party was a factor, but only one of many."
- "Forced Republicans farther to the right. This isn't your country club group anymore. It's your organized base that really doesn't like Obama or Washington."
- "Craaaaaaaaaaaaaaazy"
- "Twilight Zone"
- "Odd election timing, so hard to draw any trend like conclusions.
 Texas is still a solid GOP state."
- "People are trying to make Cruz v Dewhurst into something more complicated than it was. It was simply the case of a relentless candidate against an incumbent who had not

been in a REAL campaign in a long time."

- "We just elected a bunch of people to the state legislature that think they are going to Congress to vote on Obamacare and the EPA... they aren't interested in governing our state or running programs... just pandering to the people... it's quite possibly the low water mark in modern political history in Texas."
- "Runoff took too long, helped Cruz."
- "Down-ballot there is no clear narrative. Perry had a terrible runoff, losing Dewhurst, Medina, Hopson, Landtroop & Miller. Straus lost two more chairs. Dewhurst is the biggest loser. 2014 is very unpredictable right now."
- "More of the recent same. Bad time to be an incumbent."
- "I don't think we should read to much into this election. The timing helped the challengers. Some like the Dew ran horrible campaigns. Some like Wentworth should have exited before. Some like Landtroop where doomed to be one termers."
- "GRASSROOTS, GRASSROOTS, GRASSROOTS! Doesn't this Dewhurst loss make Carney 0 for 3?"
- "One of the three parties worked harder than the others. And they came out best, now they must produce, for which they are wholly unprepared"
- "Leadership should not have played games with redistricting. Otherwise, the primary would have been held on the regular date and the turnout

would have prohibited this from happening."

- "Horrible campaign run by Dew and it was everyone else's time to go."
- "Shows how split the rep party is and only time will tell if the ones who have been funding the party will continue to do so. Maybe TLR can get tea party money to take the place of some who are not supporting them any more"
- "The Cruz victory will intimidate Republican candidates and office holders to move further to the crazy right's positions. Long term, it will drive moderates and independents away from the Republican Party."
- "Cruz, Lozano, Villalba sure looks like Republicans will elect Hispanics."
- "Margin of victory for Cruz startling. Generational change, a new day dawns in Texas."
- "Lame duck in the mansion, lame duck in the Senate and a sitting goose in the House. The uber conservatives are going to drive the show."
- "Texas: Land of the weird. Makes Florida look sane."
- "Texas is "governed" by the Tea Party."
- "Low turn out is the perfect storm for the TP. Not that hard to influence elections when 1.1 M go to the polls."
- "More family fights to be announced at a later date"
- "Meh."

- "We're still # 1 (in teen pregnancy, poor health care quality, preventable disease incidence, # of working uninsured, etc) and now likely to stay there; is there a John Tower incident on the horizon?"
- "It's war. No more compromises. Winner take all, and salt the loser's fields."
- "Not a new era but a conservative shift in Senate. The Fall will determine direction of House."
- "Voter apathy is more obvious than ever, as is the grassroots tea party momentum"
- "Texans are renowned for our pride in our state. It is pitiful that we do not take pride in electing our leaders. The abysmal turnout should an embarrassment for every Texan."
- "Generally good for GOP to have high level Hispanic officeholder"
- "Perry seen as loyal to his friend. Cruz becomes the new Dan Patrick It was a bad night for incumbents."
- "Never underestimate the GOP's capacity for anger, which is now directed inward. If Romney loses, the internal bloodletting will begin in earnest at the national level."
- "Mixed bag really. Some new crazies to join the old. Some solid new comers. Still solid leadership available if they choose to lead. However, they will still all soil themselves when it comes to budget decisions."
- "No real surprises. Primary structure needs to be changed if

Texans are ever to have real choices to make in the fall general elections."

- "I was one of the very small percentage of insiders who said in your survey months ago that Cruz would win. It looks like the majority of us were smoking too much of Inside Austin!"
