What's the top public university in Texas?

• "UT still on top, but Chancellor Sharp doing his best to have A&M catch up. However, A&M is still in catch up mode."

• "As a transplant, the obsessive navel-gazing about UT and A&M amazes me. Texas has vast resources and could create multiple truly great universities. However, we have no vision and will not make the sacrifices necessary to create such a system."

• "A&M has become far more aggressive in terms of expansion and international focus. UT needs to work hard to catch up."

• "It's unlikely that a regional or cow college will ever match the quality or prestige of the real Big State U."

• "Oops! The taint of Rick Perry shall haunt Texas A&M for a generation."

• "There won't be a 'top' public university in this state in ten years, just several 'middling' public universities."

• "Double duh."

• "A new governor will gradually replace the anti-UT Texas Regents appointed by Perry."

• "Increased state investment will propel Tech to the top nationally."

Do you think the tension between UT's regents and UT-Austin's administration has any effect on the quality of the school?

• "Does the tension between the Tea Party and the Business Republicans effect the quality of the Republican Party? Turds in the punch bowl always play a part in quality."

• "It has no impact on a day-to-day basis for now. However, if it continues, it could have some long term effects." • "There is no doubt that the tension has effected the perception of the university and attracting top quality talent to work at UT."

• "Hard to keep good professors and top admin if there is this much fighting." • "Don't know why you would appoint people to the board that are not interested in improving the institution, but apparently that is exactly what Perry is doing."

• "It reflects poorly on an institution that should be free of real or perceived political influence!"

• "It is impossible for the friction not to impact faculty recruiting."

• "Little doubt the conflict has deterred some very qualified academics from applying to UT (or, for that matter, to other Texas universities)."

• "Heavens no. The school is the same as it has always been."

• "The political atmosphere at UT has forced the alumni to take sides. Professors are more concerned about keeping their jobs instead of teaching. Political wars at higher learning institutions always end up hurting the student body and the reputation of the university."

• "It brings down morale and it needs to stop."

• "What qualified faculty member would choose to come to a school with problems like UT's?"

• "The interference by certain members of the BOR has negatively impacted the public perception of the quality of UT."

• "The national perception that it is affecting quality is damaging by itself."

• "It hasn't effected the quality, but it had made all involved look foolish."

• "No real impact on the quality of the educational product being delivered. But a real distraction for the top administration."

• "Tough to know now whether it will effect quality; however, the headlines

and committee hearings certainly won't help in recruiting the most talented professors and researchers."

• "Anytime they are feuding inside, means they are not working together to make UT great."

• "Hopefully this changes with the new Governor."

• "It's not all football coaches. Professors will stay away if the political infighting continues."

• "These regents, at the encouragement of their governor (an aggie) have made EVERY attempt to undermine the University of Texas! They have come up with CRAZY ideas (place UT under Sunset review??), force UT to offer more ONLINE classes and a \$10,000 degree, FIRE our President! Wallace Hall is NOT the first wacko regent appointed by Perry! How important are top-rated athletic programs to the success of public universities?

• "More so in the South than anywhere else in the country."

• "You cannot dismiss the impact of athletics on a college campus. Is it the most important thing? No. But it does play a role I the overall campus demographics and environment."

• "Winning athletic programs might boost the number of applicants to a university, but that doesn't necessarily mean those are higher quality applicants. Winning on the football field isn't the same as winning in the research lab." • "Important, but not all encompassing like at UT."

• "Nothing brings more positive attention to school than a good athletic program."

• "Unfortunately, it's very important because it's all about money."

• "Definitely more important than they should be"

• "Sadly, sports overshadow academics. But let's not compound that fact by paying players. Yes, we pay coaches. And we pay professors. But we need not pay students or student athletes."

• "Less important than they think they are. But what's worse is to put all the emphasis on them AND then tolerate mediocrity the way UT has done for the past several years. That's the worst!"

• "Athletics is an important component of an institutions branding and student life."

• "Unfortunately"

• "Reality is that title nine/women's athletics and other collegiate sports benefit tremendously"

• "The athletic programs help give the schools national attention, which is a good thing. And for UT, they also provide money to the school, which is also a good thing. For those schools that can't break even on athletics or don't field winning teams...sorry guys."

• "We go to college to learn not to play sports."

• "Duke, Gonzaga and others have benefited from the publicity around their basketball teams. But a public university has a captive pool of applicants, so should limit the priority given big-dollar athletics."

• "The role of athletics in education is unfortunate. The key ought to be about research." • "Given the diminishing amount of state funding for state universities, private fundraising is key to maintaining the quality of public universities. A top rated athletic program enhances fundraising."

• "Its a huge side business that has almost no direct connection to learning. But damn it sure is fun to be big time!"

• "Success is largely dependent on two variables - (1) Can you attract students - and athletics helps, tremendously. (2) Can you keep you alums happy and involved - and athletics helps, tremendously."

• "Important, but A&M needs a defense!"

• "Very Important, but I think the Longhorn Network has done a lot of harm to UT's image."

• "Athletic success is more important than we would like to admit. It's the only frequent contact many alums have with the alma mater."

• "Swagger, press, prestige! Our academics are second to none! Sadly, a lot of ink is used to cover the football team rather than the Chemistry department (oh, that it was the other way around!)."

• "No one ever talks about the fearsome Golden Bears of Berkeley or the terrifying Chapel Hill Cavaliers, and yet these schools continue to thrive."
