The insider's poll for the week of April 4.

We're past the halfway point of this session. What's your take on the top leaders — Gov. Rick Perry, Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, and House Speaker Joe Straus?

- "Too early to tell."
- "Perry is looking at a national office, so he's posturing to the right. Dewhurst is looking at the U.S. Senate, so he's doing the same thing. Straus seems to be keeping a low profile right now--he's either indecisive or waiting for a time to make his impression felt."
- "Things are moving very slow, but that is a good thing. Legislative Redistricting will be done by the LRB so that is not an issue. The budget, if it gets passed, will be the only other issue. Who cares if anything else gets done? Adjourn and come back later in the year to finish Congressional redistricting."
- "Straus A+... Dewhurst B +... Perry D"
- "What? They are around?"
- "Perry is still stoking his ambitions at the expense of the state and remains the preeminent example of the craven officeholder in the state, if not the country. Straus is demonstrating a steady hand while dispelling any lingering fantasies that his 'moderation' would somehow save the day for the state. He's perfectly content to head for the iceberg while giving rich folks the limited number of lifeboats. I don't know who David Dewhurst is; oh, you mean the guy in line to buy the Senate seat, yeah. I guess he's doing ok."
- "Perry is in his own universe, Dewhurst is workmanlike at best and Straus can't get very far on anything."
- "Perry is being Perry, which seemingly requires that he alienate anybody whose weekends aren't spent cleaning muskets... Dewhurst What, no steroids? At least that bill did something albeit wastefully. ... Joe Straus Who's he? I think I remember reading about him in January."
- "Pretty quiet"
- "They are what they have been."

- "Perry is thinking 2 much abt a national seat and its effing up our session. Dewhurst and Straus seem to be more grounded in reality."
- "Dewhurst and Straus are doing the best they can with Perry's mess"
- "Straus and Dewhurst have some inkling of actually trying to do their jobs well, Perry does not."
- "Lt. Gov. Dewhurst is beginning to pull his weight; the others haven't shown up much."
- "Has Perry done anything that he wasn't expected to do? Other than give up a little bit more than \$3 billion from the Rainy Day Fund, hasn't this been the Rick Perry we were promised? Straus also has to be a pleasant surprise to the Tea Party and radical rightwing forces that opposed him. Straus has played their tune to a T. The Dew...well, the Dew has been the Dew...no leadership and a bit feckless."
- "They have offered minimal leadership."
- "Perry has been very disappointing. What Texas needs now more than anything else is leadership from its governor regarding revenue increases combined with spending cuts, and Perry has failed to deliver. ... Dewhurst has done a good job behind the scenes, but more publicly like Perry is failing in terms of providing real leadership... Straus is doing an admirable job managing the House."
- "Perry = head in the sand... Dewhurst = wet noodle... Straus = running the House the way it's suppose to be"
- "Dewhurst and Straus positive... Gov negative."
- "Perry: 'O Hell, stop whining we ain't got a shortfall it doesn't take a Harvard professor to know all you boys need to do is cut the waste we created in 2003!' Dewhurst: 'Senators, we don't have the votes for

cloture...uh, I mean, we're not moving the blocker bill unless it helps my Senate campaign.' Straus: 'You guys work it out, I'll be at the track. What? No, you work it out amongst yourselves. Speaker? No, you work it out."

- "I think Straus has really come into his own. His appointments to committees actually mirror what legislators wanted. Very few went home unhappy."
- "Perry an F... Dewhurst a C... Straus an A"
- "They are 'toeing' the Tea Party line very well, at the expense of 'Joe and Jane' Texan. They are astute politicians, not statesmen."
- "Great job."
- "Biggest winner is Straus. Fought off challenge and got his base happy with conservative Legislation. Dewhurst in the middle. Perry biggest loser. No progress on budget. No leadership. Looks more interested in national issues than Texas."
- "Woo. They have huge majorities and still haven't passed Voter ID."
- "Very little leadership shown by anyone so far this session. Each of the three seems to have their own agenda's and little interest in helping the other."
- "They are working particularly well together given the budgetary challenge"
- "Speaker done a good job fording difficult issues of session thus far; budget and redistricting will be imposing challenges... Gov and Lt. Gov minds seem to be far away from ensuring Texas remains a great place to live"
- "So busy kowtowing to the tea partiers that they aren't able to lead where the state needs to go."
- "Perry another good session and a great launching pad for the national stage... Dewhurst - another good session and a great launching pad for a US Senate campaign... Straus - proved his leadership abilities and solidified his conservative credentials while

maintaining his easy going style and allowing the House to conduct its business without a heavy hand."

- "Perry is disengaged and more concerned with his political career, while Dewhurst and Straus seem to be trying to save healthcare and education."
- "Perry even worse than expected. His lack of leadership is simply appalling... Dewhurst the jury is out. ... Straus - between a rock (the Tea Partiers) and a hard place (a budget acceptable to the Senate)."
- "Dewhurst Committed family man, not scared of small cows. ... Rick Perry - Really, really hates trial lawyers, very scared of coyotes... Joe Straus - Resigned to let the House pass any crazy idea that comes along, just praying they go for gambling as well."
- "Keeping things going in a difficult situation. All principled leaders."
- "The Lt. Governor and Speaker look credible."
- "Perry is playing politics... Dewhurst has yet to prove he will really confront the crisis but is making goods noises... Straus is still letting the Instant Tea Bunch run the Circus"
- "The House is running according to the will of the body: Straus A... The Senate is budgeting more than available and the Lt. Gov is eerily quiet. C... The Governor is doing what the Governor does. Bully Pulpitting C"
- "Gov Perry- No help... Lt Gov Dewhurstgetting job done... Speaker Straus- getting job done"
- "Perry-3 Dewhurst-4 Straus-5 out of a 10"
- "As to Perry and Dewhurst, remarkably predictable and dense. Still hope for the Speaker, but he has an insurmountable TP problem."
- "The problems are bigger than any of them, and all of them combined."

- "Perry has continued his assault on reason and common sense. Straus and Dewhurst seem to be focused on the process and moving legislation forward. 2 work horses and 1 show pony."
- "No discernible signs of leadership yet."
- "Where's the Speaker's leadership? The sonogram bill he set up to fail, but what else?"
- "Dewhurst thank God! Straus ho-hum! Perry - c'mon!"
- "Straus has kept the House together reasonably well. Dewhurst has not yet shown much and faces a tough challenge because he needs two Dem votes to pass a budget. He has the most on the line. Perry has been MIA for the most part and backed down in agreeing to accept \$3B of the Rainy Day Fund. The hard work remains."
- "Too early to tell"
- "Perry and Dewhurst have behaved predictably as ideologues, genuine or otherwise, positioning themselves for future office, with little consideration for the long term impacts of their policies on Texans. Speaker Straus is tougher to assess right now from my outsider perspective; it will be interesting to see the final budget and bills passed from the House at the end of session as one major indicator of how Straus has led. Right now based on media coverage and gossip, he's either very low key and behind the scenes or do-nothing."
- "Perry-AWOL... Dewhurst-Out of Touch and willing to put his GOP members at risk... Straus-The only leader in the bunch"
- "Perry's running for Veep, Dewhurst's running for the Senate, and Straus is probably searching for reasons to keep believing 'the will of the House' is still a good thing"
- "Perry is playing hard ball for the Tea Party and right-wing and winning the rhetorical battle and the Speaker and Pitts are giving in... Dewhurst and the Senate are pushing back, but the Lt. Gov. typically folds in conference."

- "I think Dewhurst is following Perry's lead more than ever because of his Senate plans and the Tea Party stuff. Straus is more independent but the huge majority is pushing him to do things he was able to avoid before."
- "Perry and Dewhurst have governed like they're still running. Straus has been low profile. Keeping his head down."
- "Straus, doing a great job of passing conservative package. Will not get credit for his leadership because of the poison spread by his opposition in the Speaker's race. Dewhurst seems to be doing a good job, behind the scenes to help guide the Senate. Perry seems distracted from state business in his effort to develop a national presence."
- "The Governor is so busy doing the ethereal waltz with national politics and the TEA party that he is not leading Texas, only his future aspirations; the Lt. Governor has a good handle on what can be done and has the Senate moving in a pretty good line (dance); the Speaker is leading but he is having to do a two step/quick step/cha cha around the TEA party which is making the process extremely slow and unrealistic for now. I mean, have you seen the House budget?"
- "So far they have not had been forced to lead on any particularly contentious issue. Now that the budget is upon us, we will see."
- "Perry is a zero. Dewhurst and Straus are very credible leaders."
- "Perry: continues to define the far right, making trouble for r budget leadership in house and senate. Tea party is the new conservatism. Positioning for VP... Dewhurst: conservative with an exposed right flank, maneuvering to win a republican us senate primary. Currently tagged with advocating Dewbamacare. So far, session has not helped his chances... Straus: RINO. Who cares that he restored honor and dignity to the Texas house."
- "I think the speaker has done an excellent job in a very difficult environment. His appointments were masterful and he has balanced some very passionately held interests as well as it could be done... Though presented several opportunities to do so,

Dewhurst has not committed a spectacular blunder and the senate seems to have been able to avoid at least for the nonce, any major meltdowns. That will likely change however as the temperature rises both inside and out. ... Perry is Perry."

- "Perry and Dew only concerned with higher office and the appearance of doing right. Straus will act in time to do right."
- "All I hear is crickets!"
- "Perry has mastered the ability to impact the legislative session without getting into the weeds on every decision. Straus is just along for the ride. Dewhurst is most interesting walking the line between the Tea Party and social conservatives and the reality that the Senate is going to spend more money than the House, not to mention pass less stringent sonogram and voter ID bills. You have to wonder too where Dan Patrick is going to wind up. Should be an interesting two months to see how all that plays out."
- "The Governor is, as usual, AWOL. He's more concerned with selling books and his nascent national political career than doing the job he was elected to do. Dewhurst and Straus are managing OK so far, but the really difficult work is just beginning, now that those 'emergency' priorities are out of the way."
- "NO leadership"

- "Straus needs to quit trying to prove he's something he's not. He could rename the pink building the Reichstag and the far right will never like him."
- "Perry gets a big fat F... Dewhurst gets a dismal D... Straus gets a C so far. He kept some Democrats in leadership positions."
- "Jury is still out"
- "Fortunately, you identified the individuals by name in your questionnaire. Otherwise, I would not have thought to include them in my take on the 'top leaders' at the halfway point this session. See answers to this question under question #2."
- "There's only one issue this session that can measure the leadership quality of Perry, Dewhurst and Straus, and that is the state budget. The budget is, in essence, a moral obligation to the constituency of Texas, and by disregarding the option to raise revenue with a narrow-minded 'no tax' pledge because it will prevent job growth sets up our republic to fail. I'm curious to know how one can stimulate the economy with a \$27 billion deficit. Unfortunately Perry, Dewhurst, and Straus have already proven that they are so beholden to their Republican ideology that they would rather let the state fail in its moral obligation to the people. I wonder how each of them will take responsibility for the butchery their ideologies, principles, and obligation to the far right have created for us?"

"What members of the Legislature are stand-outs so far — one way or another? Who should Paul Burka be watching for his biennial Best & Worst list, and why?

- "Best will be Dan Branch and John Carona. Worst will be Stef Carter."
- "Senator Duncan remains a force to be reckoned with in the Senate. Hunter appears to be working hard to be a top leader in the House."
- "Pitts is the stand out. For all the crying and handwringing that those displaced when Straus came in concerning how moderate that the new leadership was, it appears that in the clutch, Pitts is more conservative than even

Talmadge Heflin. Who would have ever thought?"

- "Worst Riddle, Berman. Paxton, Schwertner... Best - Solomons, Carona, Deuell, West, Shapiro, Eltife... Furniture - Birdwell, Jackson M,"
- "Way too early. Burka's effort on this has never been respectable. That whole project should be ended."

- "I won't answer any questions that might help him do even less work than he is doing now."
- "Good- Madden, Hilderbran, Whitmire, Bad- Martinez-Fischer, Berman, Riddle, Patrick"
- "Best: ... Sarah Davis The last bastion of guts at the Capitol. Her vote on informed consent was the most courageous thing anybody has done all session. Kudos to her. ... Mike Villarreal - The LBB employment impact analysis alone should put him on the best list... Kirk Watson - With his "Honesty Agenda" Watson has been consistent and on point even months before the session about what we are facing... Leticia Van de Putte: Bipartisanship is alive and well - at least when human trafficking is involved... Not so Best: Rob Eissler: Where are they hiding the Rob Eissler I know and love?... Moderate R Women of the House - The rush to the right wing of the Republican Party is expected. The degree of primary voter appeasement has been most distressing among the female moderates. Need I say more than 'jelly on the belly"?"
- "Too early"
- "Chairman Zerwas has been courageous and smart about both his state health care exchange bill and the Rainy Day Fund. Rep. Villarreal has had the sharpest message. Chairman Pitts has done a good job in very difficult circumstances."
- "Best- Pitts Zerwas and Deuell... Worst-caraway Schwertner and riddle"
- "Shapiro; Branch"
- "Although not a member of the legislature, I would lump Perry into the Worst list on an honorary basis."
- "Sens. Seliger, Ogden are positive standouts by taking rational stances with respect to budget reductions. Their leadership will help avert bad decisions."
- "Among the Democrats, you have to give a hand to Scott Hochberg as always. On the GOP side, clearly Ogden is trying to do the

Lord's work. Worst List? Too many to name"

- "Mark Shelton new member of appropriations quite, working hard, making cuts, but being reasonable. Jose Aliseda for proving your don't have to be a Democrat to understand what it means to be an immigrant."
- "Naomi Gonzales... Robert Anchia... The Senate Republicans on Finance, even Patrick"
- "Jim Pitts stands out in the House... Shapiro, Eltife and Van De Putte in the Senate"
