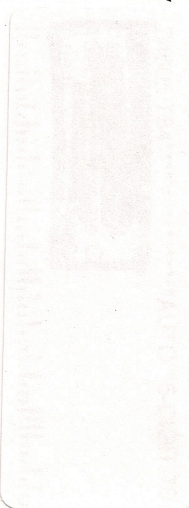

In 1986, tragedy struck in Williamson County when a young housewife, Christine Morton, was assaulted and beaten to death in front of her three-year-old son. The following year, Christine's husband, Michael Morton, was wrongfully convicted of his wife's murder and received a life sentence because the district attorney at the time withheld evidence that proved Mr. Morton's innocence.

In 2004, Morton's attorney sought to prove his client's innocence by testing DNA found on a bloodied bandana at the crime scene. **For six years, District Attorney John Bradley fought the DNA testing and only relented when forced to do so by court order.** Not only did the DNA tests confirm Morton's innocence, it also revealed the identity of his wife's true killer.

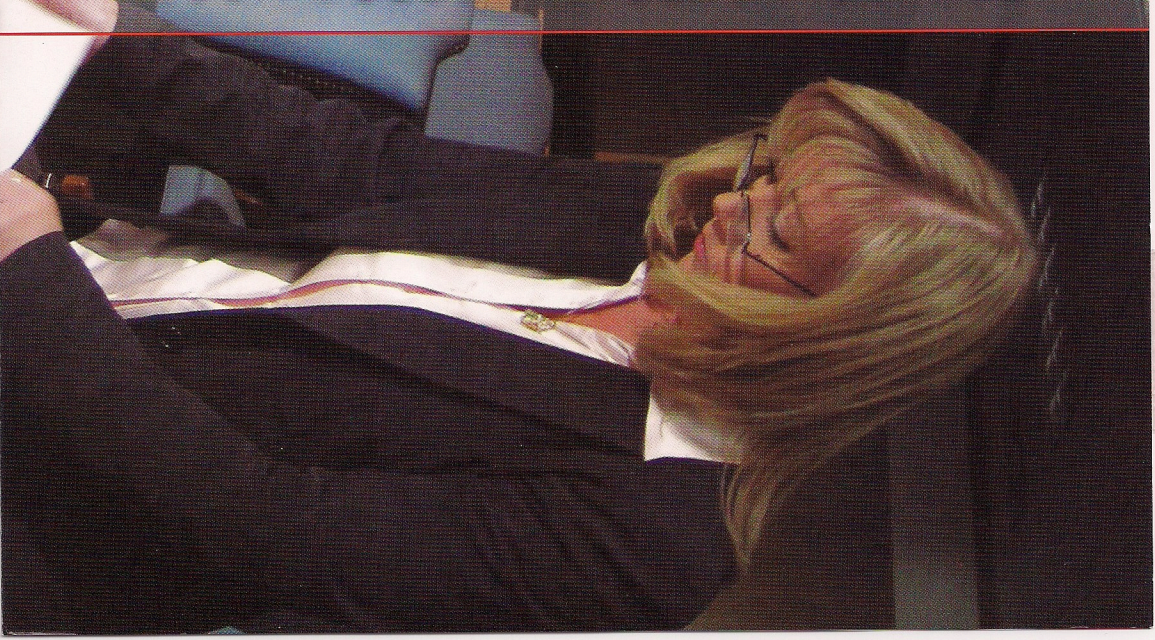

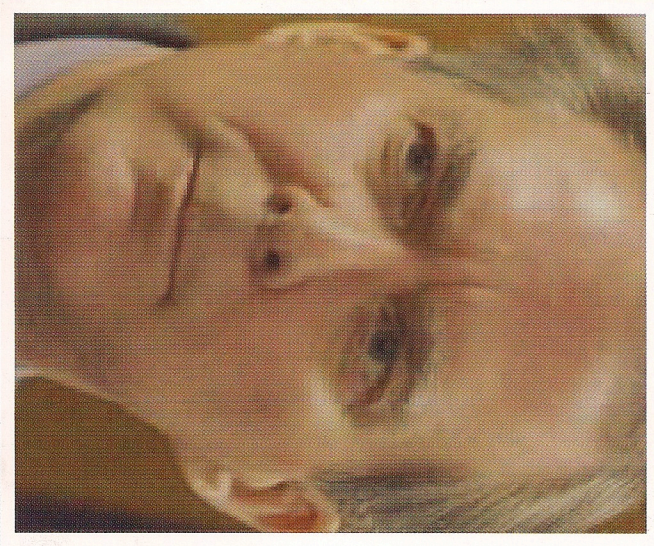

The Michael Morton Story: How District Attorney John Bradley kept an innocent man in prison to cover up for his political allies.



In 1986, a young Williamson County housewife, Christine Morton, was beaten to death in front of her three-year-old son. Her husband, Michael Morton, was wrongfully convicted for her murder and sentenced to life in prison because John Bradley's close friend and predecessor in the District Attorney's office withheld evidence that proved Morton's innocence.

In 2004, Morton's attorney sought to challenge his client's wrongful conviction by testing DNA found on a bloodied bandana at the crime scene. For six years, District Attorney John Bradley fought the DNA testing and only relented when forced to do so by an appeals court. The tests confirmed Morton's innocence and revealed the identity of the true killer, who was still roaming free on our streets; murdering more people along the way. When the case files were re-opened, we learned that John Bradley was providing political cover for his friend and predecessor by blocking the DNA tests.

In 1987, an innocent husband and father was sent to prison while a monster roamed our streets. Michael Morton sat in prison for 25 years because the evidence proving his innocence was withheld by John Bradley's close friend and predecessor in the District Attorney's office. John Bradley prolonged Michael Morton's suffering by fighting the DNA tests that proved his innocence in order to cover up for his political ally's corruption of justice.
