





The Texas Weekly/Texas Tribune insider poll for the week of 7 February 2014









## Will spending on transportation, water, and public schools be issues in the 2014 elections? (check all that apply)

- "No. Those are not sexy campaign issues. The election will be about how Obama is destroying our Texas and how democrats spend more money on high heals and using campaign funds to live a lavish life. Why would any of you think this election will be about real significant issues?"
- "It's either going to be too much or too little depending on the party affiliation."
- "No, will not be issues in Republican legislative races; unfortunately any 'new spending' is the new 3d rail of R races. Sen. Wendy Davis will try to make issue of the infrastructure and education needs of additional funding but will not get traction with majority of voters (sadly enough)."

- "So far, of course, the issues are immigration, creationism, and dates of divorce. But it's always possible that something substantive might emerge by November."
- "All three SHOULD be. Unfortunately, not enough people seem to understand we're on our way to becoming California without water."
- "Spending on public education is already a talking point for the Ds. Makes great talking point...until voters realize you're talking about raising local taxes to get it done."
- "School budgets are still reeling despite cost-cutting and 2013 restorations. Middle class families are very aware of re origins of these cuts."
- "Democrats will certainly advocate spending more, on virtually everything except border security."
- "No. I don't think the public truly understands any portion of the budget. They are mostly uninformed voters."
- "Public schools will be driven by the court. Transportation is a must, regardless of the small gains in the November Constitutional amendment. Water has money now, but there will be additional efforts to address the delivery of that money."
- "No this election is all about ideology."
- "Only if the republicans running are forced to talk about them. Otherwise

they will keep talking or I should say pandering to the far right"

- "Whatever we spend, the voters want more."
- "In the general"
- "They are always issues, but to determine the dominant one depends on the District region.
- "Like a vampire, funding of public schools is an issue that never dies.
  And when the sun shines on it all you see is smoke and mirrors."

- "They should be, but if you ask the reporters who covered the Lt Gov debate, the only relevant issues are abortion and creationism."
- "It's either not enough or too much but it's always a crisis."
- "All will be issues, but schools more than infrastructure because rivers and roads don't have unions to run commercials for them. (Yes, I'm looking at you, teachers.)"

- "At least during the 83rd some attempt was made to address these pressing needs. The 'spend no money crowd' sure needs to recognize that it's an 'investment,' and if we don't maintain our infrastructure, the state will deteriorate."
- "Water is an issue both parties know they have to address. Now, legislators will try to sneak in transportation solutions to the water bill, but MQS will send out an email and accuse Straus of being a socialist and all Republicans will retreat to their caves."
- "There will be enough money for everyone...not enough for some and to much for others."
- "They'll punt on transportation because the constitutional amendment would have passed by then. Our legislature will be uncomfortable spending more on public schools

- "Definitely transportation—they need it. Water probably gets a timeout this session. And public schools can't ever get enough."
- "Nope. Transportation is not yet seen as a crisis and public education has a spending problem, not a funding problem. The general sentiment is that we 'took care of water"
- "Depends on whether the Tea Party is successful in capturing either the East or West wing leadership. If they're not successful, look for Straus and/or Dewhurst as rational adults to invest funds in some of those areas (if not all). If, however, the Teas are successful, then don't hold your breath for any smart investments."

- "There should be money available and the public ed court case will drive that debate; with the transfer from the rainy day fund for water and the anticipated one for transportation, I don't expect to see a lot of additional money going there in this session."
- "We are coming into our first post-Rick Perry session flush with cash. Who is going to hold the line on spending now?"
- "Whiskey is for drinking, water is for fighting"
- "They'll be satisfied with the Rainy Day Fund money for water and roads, but the Supreme Court might force them into getting schools partway back to where they used to be."
- "Transportation will be an ongoing priority. If you look for businesses and people to move here, you got to have the infrastructure. School funding will depend on the courts. Districts will continue their heavy lobby about more money because we all know if they all get more money, they will all deliver Highland Park results."
- "After seeing that the public will support real investment in the future of the state, the legislature needs to make that investment more permanent and more impactful statewide."
- "Issues like pre-kindergarten and other cost-effective and proven strategies to boost student achievement will finally get the attention they deserve."

- "Economic recovery, with Texas in the lead, means there will be more to spend."
- "We can only hope that they will vote to use some of the surplus to add funds to Transportation and Public Schools. But most are so worried about their next election they can't get a majority to do the right thing. You can be conservative and take care of the states infrastructure and children...they are not mutually exclusive!"
- "Only if they can come up with an alternative to new fees and/or taxes.
  Abbott will be more conservative than Perry."
- "Transportation we hope. Water-done for now. Schools depends on what the Supreme Court says and what the members want to do."
- "Let's hope so."
- "If they are smart they will."
- "If the new Gov is the same as the old Gov, then no."
- "Only God knows what the current legislature will spend money on and he is not too sure."
- "If a few of the 'No to everything' crowd do not return, we may actually invest in the future."
- "More? Yes. Enough to keep up with inflation and population growth? What is you, a Commie?"
- "If the court tells them to, they will pony up what is needed of the every decade adjustment for schools..."

- "The Legislature won't do anything on public schools until the courts force them."
- "The courts will force the Lege to spend more on public schools."

#### Will new regulations relating to the fertilizer explosion in West or the earthquakes in Azle that some residents blame on energy exploration be an issue in the 2014 elections?

- "It is too late for these to become issues in the Republican primaries, and these will not be core issues for the one or two competitive general election races."
- "The RRC and Legislature are taking initial steps to better understand the earthquake issue; there will be some talk of potential next steps during campaign season with more action in 2015."
- "Not in this silly state! Nor will the fracking earthquakes in North Texas be an issue."
- "Probably not, but then again real issues rarely are discussed on the primary trail. Only who is pure enough."
- "Who cares if the Earth rips open and our communities explode when there is so much money to be made?"
- "While they may be legitimate controversies, neither is a potent political issue."

- "Maybe in a handful of elections, but definitely will be issues next session."
- "Looks as if this will be an issue next session though."
- "Yes, but relatively minor issues."
- "Anywhere you hear the boom of seismicity, a politician will want to do something about it."

- "Studies will be prepared and some consultant will get a chunk of change

to report back in 2017. Until then, drill here and drill now, baby!"

- "West. Not Azle."
- "Maybe but in our business friendly climate, it is unlikely. Consumer issues are not at the forefront."
