





What do you think about the direction and performance of the state government right now?

• "Reducing state agency staff and not investing in technology might make great campaign points, but it is negatively affecting how responsive state government can be. "

 "The state must be doing something right because all these folks keep moving to Texas. But when I think about issues folks care about, I'm left with the impression the state could/should do more. For example, road congestion across the state is horrible. We need new roads and we need to better maintain existing roads. Why aren't we building new roads to keep up with growth? Why don't we have funding for them today? Why didn't our leaders foresee this need? State Prop 1 is a drop in the bucket, but it at least acknowledges the issue. What about public education (performance and cost), energy, water, property tax relief, etc. "

• "We look really good when juxtaposed to the Feds. "

• "No direction, average performance. Exactly what was intended."

• "Government Performance: more or less is operating professionally and to the best of their abilities. As far as direction goes - they can only do what the Legislature tells them to do and that is a mixed bag."

• "But performance could be much better."

• "The answer is more complicated than right/wrong or good/bad. We

are generally headed in the right direction, but we need to get past the rhetoric and deal with issues honestly. We need to be conservative but that can mean being focused on performance in state government and investment in what provides a viable economic return and does not have to mean adhering to a no-new taxes or no new spending sound bite that ignores the premise that you get what you pay for."

• "Growing government by 26% over the last biennium is the WRONG direction. Thank God for oil & gas that has saved our fat from the fire."

• "State government is at a crossroads on whether or not it can meet the needs of all Texans. Pick your poison, and there will definitely be a discussion on those issues. The next two sessions will determine whether our not our leaders will meet the challenges."

- "Texas government has become a banana republic of crony corruption and neglected public services. "
- "Basic concept of low-tax, lowinvestment is running out of steam."
- "Right direction, middling performance."

• "Verbal contracts allowing political cronies to get millions in taxpayer dollars, toll roads everywhere but regular roads in horrible and dangerous conditions, state parks are struggling and in disrepair, average state employee salaries still at \$51k (since about 1990) but top level salaries have skyrocketed, college and university tuition is out of reach for most Texans, cost of living and percentage of taxes for average Texan is huge for a 'low tax state' -That was just a start."

• "More precisely, fair direction with fair performance."

• "We have denied infrastructure far too long...water, highways, etc. Borrowing money is not conservative!"

• "Dropping the social issues would also be a step in the right direction. Enough already."

• "Right Direction, we can always clean up the act"

• "Roads, water, health care and education are just being kicked down

the road. State debt has almost tripled in last 12 years, but he local guys get accused of not having their fiscal house in order."

• "Conservative principles are what Texans trust. Unfortunately, too often conservatives squander their mandate on low priority issues like social issues. Lege is currently more guilty of that than the execs but we will see what the new guys do. "

• "One-party governance is showing signs of fraying. Competition of ideas would be useful."

 "Lack of healthcare access and quality education for all Texans"

• "Economy is good, but not enough investment of our amazing fortunes in education, infrastructure, and health (including mental health) care."
