


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How long should the border surge last?





Should the Legislature set tuition rates at state colleges and universities or should the schools continue to control that?

- "State Colleges and Universities were given the opportunity to control tuition rates and they were not able to handle that responsibility. Their greed has put our state economy in jeopardy and therefore, as much as my free-economy self hates saying it, it's time for the lege to rein them in."
- "The problem isn't deregulation. The problem is university presidents who create unnecessary layers of administrative employees and non-teaching faculty. Flatten the bureaucracy and put professors back in the classroom."
- "Tuition deregulation possibly could have worked had the Legislature not ended up using it as a way to offset state support for higher education."
- "We should not let the Legislature set population controls nor tuition rates."
- "Universities have gone along with national trend of irresponsible cost increases, far above inflation."
- "If the state appropriated adequate funding, the schools wouldn't need 'deregulated' tuition."

- "Easy loans are one of the reasons tuition has gone up.... colleges will keep ratcheting up tuition as long as loans can be had...kids are graduating with more debt than ever...not good"
- "The increased tuition rates set by universities and colleges doesn't bother me near as much as the overall decline in state support to these public institutions of higher learning. While the total dollar amount appropriated by the Lege might be higher than in the past, as a percentage of the universities' overall budgets it continues to decrease. For example, in the mid-1980s, the state provided 47 percent of UT-Austin's total budget; today it's less than 15%. This is one (but not the only) reason why colleges and universities need to raise tuition-to compensate for the lack of state support."
- "Colleges and universities should set tuition according to their costs and the market, with preferential rates for Texas residents. The state should fund scholarships for Texas residents with financial need."
- "If the Legislature would give them more money the schools would be able to LOWER their tuition rates."
- "A combination"
- "Will be hard to put the tuition genie back in the bottle. Lawmakers willingly handed the power over to the colleges. Schools will not want to give it back - nor should they."
- "I wouldn't have the Legislature completely control rates, but perhaps provide some limits and controls."

- "The universities promised lower tuition if they were able to deregulate it; they lied!"
- "Maybe authorize the Coordinating Board to set tuition "
- "When the legislature cut back funding for higher ed, it lost the 'moral' leverage to put a lid on tuition."
- "This is a budget writing function."
- "What the legislature should do is provide more money to universities so they will not feel so much pressure to raise tuition."
- "There is no way I could have gone to a state university today."
- "The schools should control, but the Legislature should take the tuition rates into account when they do state funding."
- "In the past, I would have said schools should set tuition and let the market bear out the price. But the schools screwed up and spent more effort on raising money from their alumnus on awesome coaches then scholarships or paying the overhead of doing business that undergrads are now picking up."
- "The legislature represents the people (supposedly) and is more in tune with the pain of continuing rising tuition. The schools just want more money."
- "The Legislature should demand accountability for each dime. They need advice from Wallace Hall on exactly how and why that should be required."

- "Only fair to allow school to set market-based rates since State funding to individual state universities is such a small percentage of their overall budgets"
- "Schools have shown their effectiveness in setting affordable tuition for Texans...NOT!"
- "Let the schools do it. If a legislator wants to set tuition rates he should quit his office and seek appointment to a BOR."

- "The Legislature should do it, but only if they are willing to pony up the funds needed to replace any lost income."
- "We should go back to the way the state help fund universities. The deregulation of college tuition was one of the worst mistakes by the Republican legislature...all in the name of 'not raising taxes."

- "In addition to cutting costs by flattening bureaucracy and making professors teach, state schools need to harness technology to provide more distance learning options."
- "We've moved from state-supported to state-affiliated in terms of funding...must move the pendulum back or we're going to be in the same place we are with property taxes. We want more and more services and don't want to pay nuttin' for 'em!"

- "Texas legislature must commit to higher education and preparing tomorrow's workforce."

- "Increase state funding for scholarships, not to keep tuition artificially low. Have we become socialists now?"
- "More funding needed at the staff and faculty levels and for students, but administrative overhead and salaries could use a look."
- "The best way to control costs at state colleges and universities is to trust prospective students and their parents to individually factor cost in and compare that to the value provided to make the best choices possible. This is to say, let the markets work as there are no shortages of higher education consumers and producers."
- "Hold the institutions accountable for results, not allowing unbridled spending."

- "There's no 'best way to control' costs in higher education, any more than there is a best way to control gasoline prices or the size of paper towels. Either you believe in markets or you believe in government control. The current system puts its faith in markets."
- "Demand accountability for every dime given."
- "Let UT and A&M be world class research facilities, and otherwise implement Governor Perry's plan of a \$10K education, using distance learning, language labs, part-time and night classes, etc."
- "Reduce administration costs. Focus funds on faculty and facilities."

Should Texas maintain the surge of state police and National Guard troops on the Mexican border?
