What's the effect of GOP nominee Donald Trump on Republican general election voters in Texas?

• "Few real Republicans will be able to bring themselves to click that ballot for Trump. They'll skip over that race and go on to others."

• "The few remaining Chamber of Commerce Republicans will avoid straight-ticket voting this cycle. The result will be that Repubs in Harris Co., Dallas Co., Bexar Co. and a few others will get an early retirement."

• "I've never voted for a Democrat for President, but plan to do so this year."

• "I think Texas is one state where the Trump effect is negligible given the state's conservative (and somewhat irrational) leanings. I don't think most conservative voters in Texas are concerned with Trump as the presidential candidate."

• "I don't know."

• "Trump is already backtracking on many conservative issues. Peel back the orange and you find a New York liberal." • "It's pretty obvious that statewide leaders, sans Bush, are sticking with the party so I can only assume the rest of the sheeple will follow the shepherds."

• "A good Republican will never be able to vote for Hillary, so my guess is they'll just stay home, since in most places there aren't any other contested races to draw them to the polls."

• "While having Trump at the top of the ticket will likely cause some who are usually reliable Republican voters to vote for Clinton; vote for a third candidate; skip the presidential race; or just not vote, the effect will be marginal overall. It will matter in some of the few competitive districts, particularly those where Trump's anti-Latino agenda will push away conservative Latinos."

• "The Donald will now begin to morph into that more moderate conservative Republican to appeal to the great middle of the party long put off by the hardliner social conservatives. He will lose some of the Cruz supporters but he may gain just as many who would never have voted for Cruz anyway."

• "I believe there should be an 'all of the above.'"

• "All politics is local. GOP Texans may not support Trump with passion, but you better believe they'll support their down ballot Republicans."

• "He will drive up Republican voter turnout."

- "All of the above"
- "Trump will still win TX easily."
- "Two terrible candidates for Presidency... where did we go so wrong!"
- "Actually, all of the above."
- "Depends on VP"
- "It will not make any difference."

• "Even Texans may be tired of the Republican nonsense and will show up to vote in November."

• "No clue"

• "The status quo is out the window in this cycle. Who would have predicted this? And who, with any level of certainty, knows what's next?"

• "Trump's margin will not match recent GOP victories, but will be substantial."

- "Will increase turnout with first-time voters that will vote for Trump."
- "Most will probably hold their nose and still vote straight ticket."

• "While Trump's candidacy would normally keep many Republicans home, Clinton's candidacy will inspire many who would otherwise skip the race to come out. I think the sport terminology is offsetting fouls."

Does nominee Trump have a collateral effect on down ballot Republican candidates in swing districts, like Will Hurd or Rick Galindo?

• "Congressional District 23 is a pendulum district based on election cycle; Presidential cycle goes to Dems, and interim cycle goes to Repubs. Because of Trump, Hurd may be the last Republican to represent CD-23."

• "Hurd is toast. Galindo is toast. Pena is toast. Lujan is toast. Shall I continue?"

use Trump's words against him to motivate Hispanics to vote in these two districts."

• "It affects turnout. Turnout is key in swing districts. I can't help but think the GOPers aren't motivated to turn out, whereas the Dems are jazzed. This is likely bad news for Hurd."

• "It is too soon to know how much Hillary's negatives will suppress the Democrat vote."

• "If you are Republican in a swing district, you need to be seriously contemplating your next career move."

• "No clue, but based upon the emails from Dem campaigns, they're running against Trump."

• "Harder for Hurd."

• "I suspect his choice will be Jeff Sessions or Newt Gingrich." • "It doesn't appear to be personal with him — it is personal for most of his former opponents, however."

• "Who would want to be VP under Trump? Oh, yeah, Christie."

• "Maybe Chris Christie? Does he count as a former rival, since he's now on team Trump?"

• "Kasich"

• "I predict Scott Brown. He makes good arm candy to try for the female voters and has Washington political experience."

- "Possibly Kasich"
- "Or a female Governor or Senator"
- "Needs Minority"

• "Trump will pick an Admiral Stockdale type."

• "I think he picks Gingrich."

If Rick Perry were the veep nominee, does he help or hurt Trump?
