
Does the outrageous nature of the UT campus carry protest help or harm the cause of the law's critics?

#### Politics may not be beanbag, but is the political climate worse than usual?

- "We've come to demonize anyone with opposing points of view and we use all three branches of government to steamroll democracy. It's terrible."
- "The current climate may seem worse than usual only because it is playing out in the social media theater. In days of the past, the muckraking remained anonymous, and you never knew the real thoughts of your 'closest friends.' Our keyboard courage has changed our anonymity."
- "Voter suppression and slashing of school budgets are more vulgar than anything Trump can devise."
- "A POTUS candidate is encouraging violence at his events, continues to express racist and sexist sentiments. and wouldn't know the truth if it bit him on the backside — yeah, it's worse than usual."
- "The mainstream media is ignoring Hillary's record to advocate for her. Trump, according to the mainstream

media, cannot say or do anything they approve of. The mainstream media isn't pulling any punches."

- "Please don't say the 1800 election was this bad! The politics of contempt that began with the Clinton scandals and the MoveOn.org people has infected the politics of both sides."
- "Every cycle people complain about nasty politics. Sam Houston called his opponents thieves and murderers, John Q. Adams was called a pimp and Abraham Lincoln was called a baboon. There is nothing new under the political sun."
- "Let's see ... Republicans eating their young for their lack of conservative purity, Democrats eating their young for not being sufficiently socialist, or worse? Then trying to stay ahead of a 24-hour news cycle and social media? Yep ... worse than usual."
- "Politics hasn't been this coarse since the early days of the Republic."
- "In essence, the third parties have finally gotten their candidates. Libertarians have taken over the Republican Party and Socialists have taken over the Democratic Party. The extremes are driving the train."

- "It's full contact sport. And just like football, the players of today, they are bigger and stronger than ever. When they collide on the field someone's going to get hurt."
- "The problem in the presidential race is not the tone or the tactics; it is having two of the absolute worst major party nominees in American history on the ballot at the same time."
- "Same as usual ... it's just we are now seeing what once happened in the background now live on social media and TV. Nothing has changed."
- "Not fit for children on the national level. On the state level, its about the same as always."
- "Worse than usual but should be understood and seen by all, including children. The problem isn't mostly the nastiness. Rather, it's that we don't have real leaders running."
- "Look back at political cartoons over the last 200 years..."
- "Can't decide if (a) it's worse or (b) it's just business as usual but we can't get away from it anymore due to social media. Either way, it makes me want to throw up."

#### Who's played the biggest role in coarsening the discourse?

• "Politicians reflect the body politic; they no longer challenge and lead. The coarsened political discourse is a reflection of the culture. In many ways, while appearing more 'informed,' we are dumber and more crude. Stop and

listen. People curse regularly in public now, even around children. Society is not civil. The Internet, social media, and round-the-clock cable 'news' (read: infotainment) have exacerbated the decline. The reflex is outrage. The worldview is Manichean, with people feeling there are more of 'them (the evil Other)' than 'us.' The attention span resembles that of a gnat. We are juiced and expertly fed by algorithm. It's all sensation and spectacle, sizzle with no appetite for steak. How many fresh graves has Killary dug today? Wait, Kimye is wearing what?!?"

- "Trump and Dan Patrick"
- "All of the above."
- "All of the above."
- "Ad hominem attacks over substantive debate. And playing to the lowest common denominator."
- "Donald Trump"
- "Truth is no object. Vilifying and winning are all that matters. The lack of decency has been the Republican Party's undoing and may very well be all of our undoing. (For an added ick factor, this was driven by a Brit's media conglomerate messing with our national politics. After allowing that for three decades, the Russians' arrival comes as no surprise.)"
- "The voters. We love our Weiner."
- "Mainly one candidate."
- "His initials are BHO. He's pitting Americans against Americans."
- "Political operatives know that civil discourse does not motivate people to vote for or against their candidate. The overarching message of all political communications is that the opponent is

- evil and will destroy our democracy and life as we know it."
- "Politicians have promised too much, and failed to deliver. They are apparently controlled by lobbyists, not the citizenry. That's the main problem in our political life today."
- "The angry mobs. Politicians are just saying what the engaged masses want to hear."
- "Redistricting helped create this mess! While districts have always been drawn in a partisan manner, politicians desire for 80-90 percent partisan leaning districts for their own political survival is not conducive to middle-of-the-road policies and politicians."
- "Trump"
- "As the cost of elections goes up, the win-at-any-cost mentality becomes pervasive."
- "The 24-hour news cycle combined with relentless axe-to-grind 'reporting' are killing all of us. People's reactions (on both sides) are reasonable in the context of what they are hearing from their media of choice. But all significant modern 'news' sources have devolved into the high tech equivalent of yellow journalism. I don't know what the path was from William Randolph Hearst to Ben Bradlee, but I hope we can find a similar path forward with the new media."
- "The comment sections on Breitbart and MSNBC."
- "I blame those that are so angry, they would vote for Donald Trump. They

have basically said they want to blow everything up — literally!"

- "All news, all the time 24/7 combined with the selfish, self-centered social media cesspool of Facebook & Twitter leaves no room for statesmen but only room for limelight seeking, shallow zeros shouting their empty phrases inside the tiny spaces between their hash tags!"
- "Donald Trump."
- "Especially Donald Trump, but it was already bad. He just made it worse."
- "Politicians are to blame for this discourse among the electorate."
- "...fueled by ultra-right and left population in gerrymandered districts"

- "'None of the above?' Try ALL of the above. It takes a village to run a country's electoral system into the ground."

# In the case of the UT student sex toy protest against campus carry, does the outrageous nature of the protest help or harm the cause of campus carry critics?

- "Disgusting and offensive!"

## Does the polarizing presidential election make a politically bruising legislative session more likely?

- "Hillary will have won the election two months before the session convenes, so it won't be much of a factor."
- "As if the crazies on both sides needed any more material."
- "Urban Republicans (URs) are now at the same crossroads that East/West Texas Democrats were in the 90s. Can they remain part of a party that has lost touch with the values of their district? If the URs happen to survive the general, they will be in a predicament on whether or not to support hot button social issues."

- "The session will be polarized for the same reason the election is coarsened discourse."
- "The presidential election won't have much to do with the tone of the session. Most members won't be focused on budget issues ... just social 'policy' issues."
- "If Trump wins, state legislators have to compete with his extremism; if Clinton wins, they still have to compete with Trump's extremism."
- "The Straus House will likely kill every conservative bill coming out of the Senate again."
- "One can only hope that the focus will be on budget and policy issues. There will no doubt be plenty of distractions."

- "As former Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby stated, 'the legislative process is 90 percent about the budget and the 10 percent is poetry.' The budget will be the big issue but, with the lack of money, social issues will be good political fodder because the members will not have a lot of opportunities to do things that are meaningful. Last session, the state had an abundance of money and the leadership had a difficult time getting on the same page. Imagine how it will work with no money to fund the leadership's priorities. Special Session!!!!"
- "Hard to find much relationship between Trump/Clinton and forthcoming legislative session."
- "Not in Texas. The Houston delegation will bipartisanly fight the Dallas delegation for money just like they always do ... and so on and so on."
- "There are so few really contested legislative races in November, the answer is simply No and it doesn't have anything to do with budget and policy issues."
- "Neither. The Donald is a rare and odd occurrence that won't have much lasting impact on Texas state politics. But the election of Hillary will recharge the batteries of the 'Washington is evil' agenda. Get ready for four more years of vigorous Texas federalism."
- "Up until mid-April budget & policy, then it's all social issues all the time."

- "Some will still try to be the legislative equivalent of Robert Morrow.

  Legislators need to respect the office they were elected to instead of being part of a group of anarchists."
- "Straus keeps his body's eye on the ball and keeps Senate in check. Patrick plays in the mud and solves bathroom problems."
- "This may finally have been enough for them to realize how much responsibility Texas' politicos have for the current climate. Not!! "
- "Yes! It is more important to know who is peeing next to you and to protect the 'ladies' than caring for abused kids, building highways, and out of control property taxes..."

- "There is not any money! The budget will be the focus next session and will take up a lot of time."
