





The Texas Weekly/Texas Tribune insider poll for the week of 3 February 2017









As of right now, on whose side is Gov. Greg Abbott?

- "Abbott wants no light between himself and the Republican right. Straus appears to care little what the statewide primary voter thinks."
- "Where is the choice for 'both'?"
- "His own trying to strengthen the executive role in Texas government."
- "He doesn't want the Tea Party mad at him, so he'll continue to push convention of the states. He's concerned about bathroom bill and will pray the House waters it down or kills it. That means he's not really on either

- side. With \$35m in the bank, he should be more confident and bolder. He isn't either."
- "Bathroom bill is the line in the sand between actual Republicans and showboats."

- "Kent Hance used to say, 'Who is the most powerful vote in the Railroad Commission?' 'The third vote.' Abbott would be wise to choose sides between the House and Senate as he sees fit and always be the third vote. This is also consistent with him not wanting to be out front. Rank and file House Republican lawmakers are still upset he didn't come campaign for them. We now know where Abbott is on Rainy Day Fund so that appears to be a victory for the Senate view. The press will likely cover him as closer to the Senate, but we still don't know that yet."

The final spending number in the budget ends up closer to the figure proposed by which chamber?

- "Tell me whether there will be a successful vote to take money out of the Rainy Day Fund and then I will answer your question."
- "If appropriations are closer to the Senate's starting point, that just means the Legislature will have created a very, very large supplemental spending bill
- for 2019. (The difference between 'appropriated' up front in 2018-19, and ultimately spent by the end of fiscal 2019.)"
- "The 104.9bn is still kinda a misleading number because it does not include the \$5bn for roads. We spent \$113bn last session. We can have some

garden-variety delays and underfunding Medicaid and get out of Dodge without cuts. At the end of the day, there is nothing inherently 'conservative' about a \$10bn rainy day fund. Both House and Senate budgets are fake at this point, the Senate budget is particularly fake."

- "Senate will cave when the true costs of their draconian budget become more clear."
- "The Comptroller's number will grow as the economy improves under Trump. That will give the Comptroller the confidence to increase the number."

- "Wiggle room"
- "The final budget will actually be higher than both the initial chambers' budgets. It will be closer to the House's initial offering, but they're both too low right now."
- "Expect program changes adopted in the budget that will allow budget to balance and remain on the low end, but that will negatively impact consumers of services and providers in Art II; and public schools in Art III."
- "They will split the baby."
