

## Lawmakers will look here to free up cash to fund a tight state budget this year...

• "Patrick promised not to raid the State Highway Fund again, so he's in a pickle."

• "And depending on how dire the situation gets, don't forget about other 'protected and dedicated' funds, like TERP and the Crime Victims Compensation Fund."

• "They will look at both but there is no political will to spend the RDF."

• "But, it will be a hard fought fight to the end!!!"

• "There is growing buyers' remorse on the highway diversion and if NAFTA is in trouble then the highway pork is in trouble. The Rainy Day Fund is in play particularly in light of the limited carry over funds to plug holes from previous budget."

• "No better than 50 percent chance of success, but I would guess they'll make the effort to tap it."

- "It's the Texas Senate..."

• "This bill is a priority of the grassroots, Dan Patrick and most seriously conservative legislators. It is will probably pass. In terms of the NFL, a lot of people already hate them. They support a guy who doesn't stand up for the national anthem. Even folks who love their Texas teams don't love the NFL. They can't afford to boycott Texas. Who cares what they think?"

• "To the Senate, they could care less if we lost out on Super Bowls, Final Fours and other sports and musical acts to tour Texas. They are more inclined to support their base than a threat from the entertainment industry. Thank God the House has its head on straight!"

• "The direct impact is probably viewed on Houston and Dallas, so others won't count the pennies they receive from such events."

• "The Lt. Gov. office was waiting to get past Super Bowl Sunday before reheating the bathroom bill but the NFL fired a quick shot across the legislative bow and they mean what they say. The NCAA is not far behind and they mean what they say as well. Just ask basketball fans in North Carolina."

• "It will die a slow death in the legislative process, but the pain will be felt most by those Texans who are most vulnerable and impacted by poor policy proposals and discriminatory decisions." • "Stuff like this only irritates people. It even got Gov. Abbott to chime in on the topic."

• "This is only going to pass over Jerry Jones' dead body."

• "Senate will pass the bill and thankfully the House will kill it."

• "Just provides a way out of the trap for some who don't like the bill but might otherwise be forced to say aye."

• "As they say on Wall Street, the market price already reflects such risks."

• "It is DOA in the House. More fascism from the left. Where have my liberal friends all gone?"

• "Texas Republicans aren't afraid of taking a hit at the ballot box, but they are afraid of taking a hit at the deposit box."

• "Who cares? Super Bowls just cost our cities money. Call it the billionaires' subsidy."

• "The NFL does not have a team in Brenham."

• "Senate not interested in Super Bowl or tourism. Just want to know about bathrooms." • "It's passing the Senate no matter what."

• "Bill was never intended to actually pass. The NFL does — however make Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick look ridiculous."

• "In a match-up between the state's ego and its tendency to pander to voters' fear and worst instincts, it's tough to say what will win."

• "The voters care more about their privacy and safety than they do about sports leagues, fat cat team owners, and spoiled athletes who thumb their nose at long established cultural norms and customs. Remember, most voters will never be able to see a NCAA Tournament or Super Bowl anywhere other than their TV set. But everyone ends up needing to take a potty break away from home."

• "As a super lib on immigration issues, even I am offended that child rapists are not being turned over to ICE by local law enforcement. If I can support this law, I think 90 percent of other Texans will likely support it as well."

• "They'll still probably be able to pass something on sanctuary cities, but these arrests will make them feel worse about voting for it." • "Since when is violating the law a good thing?"

• "Zero impact in the Senate, only marginal impact in the House as a whole, Joe Straus notwithstanding."

• "If you've paid any attention to election results recently, the voters are crying out for immigration laws to be enforced."

• "I doubt it. But if they pass it, what will Abbott do — sign or veto it? Will he sacrifice and risk the political successes in the vast majority of state to appease a couple urban counties?"

• "I think we know that a lot of Republican legislators probably got into office because of straight ticket voting, so I find it hard to believe that those folks would support a bill that could put them out of office."

• "Dallas and Houston have to convince others why it hurts."

• "Justice Hecht was correct, but in a state that is driven to preserve minority rule that is not a change in the making."

• "Oh, wait, because the Repubs lost Harris, Dallas & Bexar counties they want to get rid of straight ticket voting."

- "Sad but true. We're stuck with it."
- "Perhaps in judicial races..."
- "Again, why is this a problem?"
- "But anything is possible here."

• "There is just no actionable momentum among the Rs or the Ds to do away with straight ticket voting."

• "Read: Harris County Republican Party Joint Judicial Campaign biennial candidate \$hakedown won't be enough to win if Harris County remains 52 percent D." • "Those who powder themselves in the status quo know better than to change the status quo."

• "With any luck they will reinstall a literacy test for voters as well."

• "Repealing straight ticket voting would be suicidal for Republicans."
